1. Child refugees: legal and policy approaches

1.1. Child refugees and UN Convention on the Rights of the Child (CRC)

- Refugee children: an uncertain status
- Status of invisibility (national/international level)
- Migration control prioritized at expense of rights' protection
- Ambivalent approach regarding UAMs
- Limited and fragmented legal and policy provisions



- 1.2. Common European Asylum System (CEAS), Child Rights and UAMs
- CEAS: 'fortress Europe'
- Security objectives prioritized over human rights objectives
- Limited rights-based approaches
- Gaps in CEAS vis-à-vis UAMs
- UAMs: falling through the cracks of various systems
- Unclear responsibility for UAMs



2. Refugee Crisis and UAMs

Refugee crisis: a crisis of CEAS
Culture of disbelief and suspicion
EC policy: not fit for purpose
Context: financial pressures



2. Refugee Crisis and UAMs

- Problems faced by UAMs across Europe:
- 1. Protection of children's rights
- □ 'Best interests of the child': not observed in practice
- □ 'Child participation': not observed in practice

- 5. Holistic approaches to UAMs' protection




3. Explaining failure to protect UAMs

One of the explanations: 'bystander effect' and diffused responsibility

Features:

- Apathy
- Diffused responsibility
- Fragmented responsibility
- Ambiguity




3. Explaining failure to protect UAMs

1. Horizontal responsibility

- No multi-sectoral approach to UAMs' protection
- No holistic approach to UAMs' protection
- No upholding of child rights

2. <u>Vertical responsibility</u>

- Fragmented division of responsibility between EU, national & local levels
- No cross-border coordination and cooperation
- Limited inter-agency cooperation
- No overarching approach to protection
